all the talk what educational tests can and can't tell you and how scores can be misunderstood and misused remains a mystery to most the complexities of testing are routinely ignored either because they are unrecognized or because they may be well complicated inspired by a popular harvard course for students without an extensive mathematics background measuring up demystifies educational testing from mcas to sat to wais with all the alphabet soup in between bringing statistical terms down to earth daniel koretz takes readers through the most fundamental issues that arise in educational testing and shows how they apply to some of the most controversial issues in education today from high stakes testing to special education he walks readers through everyday examples to show what tests do well what their limits are how easily tests and scores can be oversold or misunderstood and how they can be used sensibly to help discover how much kids have learned

evaluation sends a message it points to what is valued and ignores what is not perceived to be important educational evaluation testing and assessment has been telling students teachers administrators and legislators that the system values rote memorization and passive recognition of single correct answers
